Reflection on the Sunday Gospel

In John's Gospel, we encounter a powerful moment when Jesus enters the temple and finds it filled not with prayer but with profit. The sacred space meant for communion with God has become a marketplace. In response, Jesus drives out the merchants and money changers, overturning tables and declaring, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!"

This dramatic scene can feel jarring. We're used to thinking of Jesus as gentle and compassionate, but here we see His righteous anger. Yet this is not uncontrolled fury—it is a passionate defence of what is holy. Jesus is not simply reacting to noise or clutter; he is confronting a deeper distortion: the loss of reverence, the replacement of worship with transaction.

The temple was meant to be a place where heaven touched earth, where people came to encounter the living God. However, over time its purpose had been diluted. In cleansing the temple, Jesus is calling people back to the heart of worship—back to a relationship with God that is sincere, humble and free from distraction. Jesus clears the space, not out of anger alone, but out of love—for the temple, for true worship and for the people who had lost sight of both.

Today, this dramatic moment is paired with the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, the oldest church in the West and the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome. More than a celebration of bricks and mortar, this feast reminds us that the Church is not just a building—it is the Body of Christ, and we are its living stones.

The readings from Ezekiel and Paul deepen this message. Ezekiel's vision of water flowing from the temple, bringing life to everything it touches, is a powerful image of God's grace. The temple is not static—it is a source of healing, fruitfulness and renewal. Likewise, Paul reminds us that You are God's building... God's temple... and God's Spirit dwells in you." The foundation is Christ himself and we are called to build our lives upon him with care and integrity.

These readings converge in a profound truth: the true temple is not just a sacred place—it is a sacred people. Like the temple in Jerusalem, our hearts can become cluttered. Jesus' zeal for the temple is also his zeal for us. He longs to clear away what clutters our inner life—resentment, fear, pride—and make space for grace. This cleansing is not a one-time event, but a lifelong journey inward, a continuous entering into the "King's room," as St. Teresa of Avila describes in *The Interior Castle*. We may find ourselves distracted, burdened or spiritually dry. Jesus' cleansing of the temple becomes a personal invitation: to let Him enter, overturn what does not belong and restore us to right relationship.

When challenged by the authorities, Jesus speaks of the temple of His body: "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." His words point forward to His death and resurrection, revealing that the true dwelling place of God is not a building, but the person of Christ. Through Him, each of us becomes a living temple—a place where God's Spirit longs to dwell.

In today's world, where negativity and uncertainty often dominate, this passage offers a pastoral message of hope and renewal. Jesus doesn't just cleanse the temple—he restores its purpose. He does the same for us. When we invite him into the messiness of our lives, may we allow Him to enter, overturn what needs to go and rebuild us as temples of His presence. Like the Lateran Basilica, let us stand as signs of God's enduring presence where our hearts are places of prayer, peace, praise, compassion and mercy—living temples where Christ is truly at home.

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATTER BASILICA

In the city of Rome, there are four major basilicas. The first three are Saint Peter's Basilica in Vatican City, the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, and the Basilica of Saint Mary Major. The fourth is the Archbasilica Cathedral of the Most Holy Saviour and of Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist in the Lateran, also called Saint John Lateran, or the Lateran Basilica for short. Of the four major basilicas, the oldest and "most important" is Saint John Lateran, the dedication of which is remembered today. Though the pope now lives next to Saint Peter's Basilica, Saint John Lateran is the official cathedral of Rome. That means Saint John Lateran is not only the mother church of the Archdiocese of Rome but also the mother church of the entire world.

PHILIPPINES TYPHOON APPEAL

The Sisters of the Good Samaritan Foundation has launched an urgent emergency appeal following the destruction caused by Typhoon Tino, which has severely impacted communities on the island of Negros in the Philippines. While Australian media coverage has focused largely on the impact of the Category 4 Typhoon Kalmaegi (locally known as Typhoon Tino) in Cebu, the neighbouring island of Negros where long-standing Good Samaritan ministries are located has also suffered extensive damage. In Boulevard homes have been destroyed, and large sections of the community have been washed away. Families are displaced and many are now seeking makeshift shelter, with limited access to food, clean water, and essential supplies. Inland communities have also been affected, including the Sisters of the Good Samaritan Kinder School. The foundation has established an emergency relief appeal to provide assistance, including shelter materials, meals, and assistance to rebuild homes. "Your contribution will help families already living with vulnerability rebuild their communities." Sonya Mears, executive director of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan Foundation, said.

With Treaty legislation having just been passed by Parliament, Victoria is listening to the calls from our First Peoples to take substantive action for justice. Church leadership in Australia has been clear in support for truth-telling and treaty processes through endorsing the Uluru Statement From the Heart. Catholic Social Services Victoria (CSSV) is partnering with the Australian Catholic University to present a forum to consider the Yoorrook Justice Commission, Australia's first formal truth-telling process, and what its findings mean for our sector and the wider Catholic community. 
