**A Reflection on Sunday's Gospel.** [An exert from Pope Francis Explains]

Today's Gospel invites us to reflect on the theme of salvation. Jesus is going up from Galilee to the city of Jerusalem, and along the way, says St. Luke the Evangelist, someone asked him, "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" (13:23). Jesus did not answer the question directly: it is not important to know how many are saved, but rather, it is important to know what is the path of salvation. And so, Jesus responds to the question by saying, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough" (v. 24).

What does Jesus mean? What is the gate by which we enter? And why does Jesus speak about a narrow gate?

The image of the gate recurs several times in the Gospel and is reminiscent of home and hearth, where we find safety, love and warmth. Jesus tells us that there is a gate that allows us to enter into God's family, into the warmth of the house of God, of communion with Him. This gate is Jesus himself (cf. Jn 10:9). He is the gate.

He is the gateway to salvation. He leads us to the Father. And the gate that is Jesus is never closed, this gate is never closed, it is always open and open to everyone, without distinction, without exclusions, without privileges. Because, you know, Jesus does not exclude anyone.... Don't be afraid... Be lively, have the courage to enter through His gate. All are invited to pass through this gate, to pass through the gate of faith, to enter into His life, and to allow Him to enter into our life, because He transforms it, renews it, the gifts of full and lasting joy.

Nowadays we pass many doors that invite us to enter, that promise a happiness that then we realise lasts but a moment, which is an end in itself and has no future. But I ask you: which gate do we want to enter? And who we want to through the gate of our lives? I want to say emphatically: don't be afraid to pass through the gate of faith in Jesus, to let Him enter more and more into our lives, to go out of our selfishness, our being closed in, our indifference toward others. Because Jesus illuminates our life with a light that never goes out. It is not a firework, not a "flash"! No, it is a soft light that always endures and that gives us peace. That is the light that we meet if we enter through the gate of Jesus.

Certainly, it is a narrow gate, the gate of Jesus, not because it is a torture chamber. No, not because of that! But because it asks us to open our hearts to Him, to recognize ourselves as sinners, in need of His salvation, His forgiveness, His love, needing the humility to accept His mercy and to be renewed by Him. Jesus in the Gospel tells us that being a Christian is not having a "label"! [But] Christians in truth, in the heart. To be Christian is to live and witness to the faith in prayer, in works of charity, in promoting justice, in doing good. For the narrow gate which is Christ must pass into our whole life.

We ask the Virgin Mary, the Gate of Heaven, to help us to pass through the gate of faith, to allow her Son to transform our existence as He transformed hers, in order to bring everyone the joy of the Gospel.

In keeping with our commitment to keeping our community safe and proving a safe environment for all, particularly children, young people and vulnerable adults, we will celebrate our annual Safeguarding Weekend on 6 / 7 September. During August we will focus on and promote a number of safeguarding initiatives.

Our Safeguarding Weekend will focus on the deeper meaning of 'Safeguarding' as we continue to strengthen the culture of care in our community. Our parish holds the values of dignity, commitment to justice and care for the vulnerable at its heart. We also need to continue our support for the important regulatory and compliance components of Safeguarding, areas that are PLDT and Safeguarding Committee primarily manage for us.

Building a culture of safeguarding is essential in fostering a parish environment where everyone—children, young people, and vulnerable adults—feels safe, respected and valued. It goes beyond compliance with checks and regulations; it involves cultivating awareness, accountability and proactive practices in every aspect of parish life. When safeguarding is embedded in the parish culture, it encourages parishioners to speak up about concerns, model respectful behaviour and support one another in maintaining a safe community. This collective commitment helps prevent harm and ensures that the parish remains a place of trust, care and spiritual growth for all.

A Working With Children Check (WWCC) is important for all parishioners, even those who do not directly work with children, because it helps ensure the safety and well-being of everyone in the parish community. By undergoing this check, parishioners demonstrate a commitment to creating a secure, trusted environment where everyone can participate in church activities without risk. It reinforces a culture of vigilance and responsibility, showing that the parish prioritises safeguarding and the protection of its most vulnerable members.

# VETERAN PEACEKEEPER CALLS FOR PRAYER AND ACTION OVER GAZA

In the wake of ongoing violence in Gaza, Brisbane Deacon Gary Stone has written an open letter calling for Catholics and people of goodwill to unite in prayer and action for a just resolution to the conflict. Deacon Stone, who founded the Veterans Care Association, offers his perspective as a soldier who has spent 48 years in the Australian Defence Force and Australian Federal Police – as a senior infantry officer, peacekeeper and more recently, as a Catholic chaplain.

Deacon Stone stated that, "... There is no simple or quick fix to this complex situation" but the situation is now "beyond catastrophic. We must rise up as humanity to take whatever measures are needed stop the fighting and get humanitarian aid flowing," he said.

"But in due course, there must be a glimmer of hope for movement toward a just and lasting solution that honours the dignity and rights of all people in the region.

Deacon Stone appealed to "Catholics and Christians across Australia, and to all people of goodwill, to unite in prayer and action". "Let us:

- Pray for peace in Gaza and for healing among all who suffer.
- Speak with compassion and courage to promote understanding and reject hatred.
- Advocate by contacting elected officials and community leaders urging them to support diplomatic efforts and humanitarian aid for civilians affected by the conflict.
- Gather in interfaith and community events that foster dialogue, solidarity, and reconciliation.
- Support reputable humanitarian organisations working on the ground to provide relief and protect the vulnerable.

"Let us also commit ourselves to peaceable conduct here at home, especially in our conversations with those who may hold different views."

# CARITAS AUSTRALIA LAUNCHES PUBLIC PLEDGE TO END HUMAN SUFFERING IN GAZA

Caritas Australia launched an urgent public pledge calling on the Australian Government and international community to prevent a possible catastrophic drop in humanitarian aid to Gaza - with levels already life-threatingly low. As a result of the conflict over 60,000 lives have been lost, including more than 18,000 children, with the entire population of Gaza now in the grip of a starvation crisis. In response, Caritas Australia is urging supporters to sign the pledge and amplify the call for increased aid access and a ceasefire.

"The people of Gaza cannot eat less than they already are," said Caritas Australia's CEO Kirsten Sayers. "Every signature helps protect innocent lives and ensure vital aid reaches those who need it most."

The pledge will be delivered to the Australian Foreign Minister's office on Monday the 1 September. It calls for:

- Safe, unhindered, and large-scale humanitarian operations
- An immediate and unconditional permanent ceasefire
- Protection of civilians and aid workers
- The release of all Israeli hostages and Palestinians arbitrarily detained by Israel

In addition to signing the pledge, Caritas Australia is offering a range of resources and actions for Catholics and all Australians who wish to stand in solidarity with the people of Gaza. These include:

- Writing to your MP using Caritas Australia's letter-writing guide to advocate for peace and humanitarian access.
- Praying in solidarity, with downloadable prayer resources for parishes, schools, and homes.
- Lighting a candle in remembrance or sharing a simple meal as a symbolic act of solidarity.
- Donating to provide urgent food, water, shelter, and medical support.

"This is not just a crisis—it is a test of our shared humanity," said Kirsten Sayers.

"As an agency of the church we are called to amplify the voices of those in need, and to act with compassion, courage, and hope."
